great detail.

THE CHAIRLADY: As I know you are aware, we are quite anxious to produce a document which is terse and covers only the most basic --

DR. KUHN: I think the courts in their examination of these constitutional provisions for universities, public universities, have tended to single out very short passages in this total. For example, in the University of California item, just the first three lines have really been singled out as a basis for the university to move ahead and not all the rest of it. It has no particular importance in context.

THE CHAIRLADY: Would the university have been precluded from moving ahead without such provision in the California Constitution?

DR. KUHN: I don't think anybody could say whether it would or would not. You can say, I think, regardless of the student incident that may not in the long run be a benefit to the nation at all, but the real
