black eye of the University of California in Berkeley
last year -- but there has been no institution in this
country that has made the progress, that had made the
contribution to our defense during the war years, that
has more Nobel Prize winners, than the University of
California. This is not just autonomy. This is governmental support of higher education.

MRS. FREEDLANDER: I'm a member of the Declaration of Rights Committee and would like to take advantage of your being here to ask a question. Although you indicated that academic freedom has a self-policing aspect because of the accreditation of institutions, would you conceive of having such a provision in the Declaration of Rights to protect all institutions, including public schools and the like, because every once in a while righteous groups get up their dander and say what books should be used in schools and what teachers should or should not teach?

Do you believe that there is a place in the Declaration of Rights for a general provision on academic freedom?
