whichever you choose to call it. It ought to provide
for the establishment of a State education agency. The
existing Constitution makes no mention of a State education agency. The one in 1864 did, but this does not.

It ought to provide for the support of the
public school system by the General Assembly through
taxation, which this one does. Then it ought to provide

the adequate safeguards for the administration of a system of free public schools. Fortunately, I've been a member of the National Committee, the Study Commission of the chief State school officers for more than fifteen years and one of the things we have concerned ourselves with is the State Department of Education, and about ten years ago we prepared a little bulletin called the State Department of Education, which was revised in 1963, and that bulletin sets forth the following as to the constitutional provisions for education.

It says the State Constitution should contain the basic provisions for the establishment of a central education agency and should empower and direct the legislature to formulate a general plan for placing

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
