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State colleges, the community colleges and the State
Department and the State boards and so on. Now, again,
beware of spelling them out, but do it so this is inclusive.

May I take your time for just one illustration. Again, this is a rebuttal in this matter of whether or not there is sufficient funds for every youngster who is able and willing to go to college these days, as Dr. Kuhn implied, and frankly there is not, in my opinion. Again, I revert to my experience in higher education. I once visited, in the days when you recruited students, a young man in this State who had the top record of his school, his high school. His family lived in a converted chicken house. When I talked with the boy about going to college, he was leaning against the handles of a plow behind a mule, plowing corn, and when I tried to get him to go to the institution that I represented on about a 75 per cent scholarship, he looked at me wistfully and said, I can't go, I can't go.

Now, this is the kind of person Dr. Pullen was talking about. Here was the top person in his class
