MRS. ROBIE: I am at 9348 Reed Circle, Fort Washington, Maryland, 20022, I am also the National P-TA Program Chairman, at the moment. Having worked with these other states, through the P-TA National Board, well, of course, we talk a great deal about the problems that come up and legislation has been one of our major items of work, and we have always been so very impressed with the manner that we are able to get things over in Maryland, with the twenty-three counties and Baltimore City making it so much easier to do things in our State. We just, if you look around at the way education is operating, you can tell that we have a very fine system, and so I am relieved now in hearing what has been said today because when I heard of the meeting, I thought, oh, the State Board of Education members would like to be here because they would have a great stake in this; but it does seem that you have had these advantages of our State pointed out and, as Mr. Raver said, that we may have more to lose than to gain and I would certainly want to point out the fact that I am not one not to want to rock the boat, if rocking the boat is a good idea.
