with the articles that you mentioned as specifically as I would like to be, but it does seem to me that it would be well for the Commission to consider some statement which in a sense supports the value and the contribution of independent education in a broad sort of way, rather than leaving it entirely out of consideration.

MR. ENEY: The second question, do you think it desirable to include in the Constitution some provision for specific aid to private institutions as, for example, tax exemption, which is now a matter of statute and not a matter of constitutional right?

MR. LAMBORN: I am speaking entirely for myself, now, sir. I would think that it would be helpful to have a broad generalized statement such as tax exemption. When it goes from there to specific aid, in terms of outflow of dollars, I would make a distinction there.

THE CHAIRLADY: Mr. Raver, did you have any comment in that area, as to whether there should be any reference to private education in the Constitution?
