2 to be under strict subordination to, and control of, the  
3 civil power; certainly, we don't want to delete that  
4 from our Bill of Rights. I wouldn't think so. We firmly  
5 believe that in America. I believe this is one of the  
6 fundamental things that we teach in history, one of the  
7 fundamental things we teach in government, one of the  
8 fundamental things we teach in civics, and that no  
9 soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any  
10 house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of  
11 war, except in the manner prescribed by law; this is  
12 still in the Federal Constitution.

13 Why not repeat it in the Bill of Rights, if  
14 nothing else, as a teaching point for the people and  
15 maybe this is the psychological and moral impact this  
16 gentleman was talking about. It seems there are from  
17 certain quarters attempts to sort of whittle away some  
18 of our fundamental rights, as contained in the Bill of  
19 Rights, and I'm not talking about self-incrimination,  
20 but most of you know this book, and certainly you ought  
21 to read it, if not, the Bill of Rights, on Page 77, in
