

1 on meat and on grain, and we still have in our declara-
2 tion the purposes, not in that same language, but somehow
3 the feeling of the same language and, of course, out of
4 the Grange there came the granger laws and there has been
5 an essay in almost all the law schools in the United
6 States that is just currently in process; having law
7 students write essays on the Grange laws, particularly
8 the Interstate Commerce Commission, which grew out of
9 this effort and the Sherman Anti-Trust Law.

10 Certainly, we have some feeling, some belief
11 in this. We know there are monopolies of different kinds.
12 One is probably a necessity in economic life, but cer-
13 tainly this is a necessity and affirmation, I believe,
14 in this connection.

15 So, I believe this would point out most of
16 the things I would wish to comment on and, I'm sorry I
17 didn't have time to write this up, but if you want it,
18 I will try to find time to write it up and give it to
19 you.
