it wasn't really to be taken too seriously, anyhow. 1 THE CHAIRMAN: How long should we expect the 2 Constitution to last? Are we too far ahead? 3 MR. SYKES: Well, now, if you can get a consensus on that question and you could draft a provision which everybody is going to agree is just the proper number of years ahead, you will have helped to solve 7 your problem, that's my point, and if you can't, maybe 8 you shouldn't. Can I make one statement for the record. 9 just as a matter of my own scholarly pride? I miscited 10 Carl Becker's book. The book I intended to refer to was 11 the Declaration of Independency, not the City of --12 THE CHAIRMAN: Professor Rosen? 13 PROFESSOR ROSEN: I just want to suggest one 14 thing on my own, if you will. 15 THE CHAIRMAN: You will switch hats, now? 16 17
