2 MR. SACHS: You are going to have dissent on
3 many provisions of the Constitution, but the ones in-
4 volving civil rights, what I'm trying to say is that
5 there you can be pretty sure that the Constitution will
6 not be adopted. Now, I may be wrong.

7 MR. SYKES: I would like to make one practical
8 suggestion which kind of illustrates some of the problems
9 we have been talking about. I want to guard against it
10 being taken out of context, so I say in the record that
11 it shouldn't be taken out of context. It can only be
12 understood in connection with the entire discussion; but,
13 if you want a model and a source of numerous suggestions
14 for the really fine drafting of provisions like the ones
15 you are talking about, I would suggest that you will find
16 them best exemplified in the Constitution of the Union
17 of Soviet Socialist Republics, and you have very beauti-
18 ful provisions about religious freedom, freedom to work,
19 civil liberties and so on. If you are going to write
20 them, they are a very good source for drafting.
