them to adopt it, if you think you can tear up and disrupt everything the people have learned to live with, you are going to have a problem.

THE CHAIRMAN: We certainly cherish that thought because we think it's an important one. Let's move onto some mundane things, now.

MR. BROOKS: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman. I wonder if we could get a few more comments on the size of the House, just narrowing No. 9 to that? We've had one statement. I wonder if we could have any others reported tonight on the size of the House?

THE CHAIRMAN: Senator James?

SENATOR JAMES: I gave the statement originally that I thought the unicameral house should have 30 or 35 districts with two members in each district. That would give you a legislature of from 60 to 70 people.

I disagree with Mr. Hardwicke in this respect.

I don't think that the local unit in which you have your home rule would bear any relationship to the representation in the legislature. I think that the districts would be relatively small, maybe 125,000 each, represented by
