feel as bad as the legislature, or the problems the legislature has, I think now, once you set it up and once a legislature has been convinced it has to be reapportioned, it took us two years to redistrict the City of Baltimore, as you well know, but we did it. It took a lot of fighting and arguing and we did it, but we did it; but I would be frankly scared to death to say to the Governor, that he do it.

MR. HARVEY: Suppose you said if the legislature didn't do it within a certain time, that the Governor could do it?

DELEGATE MANDEL: That's what we did in the bill we passed. If the legislature didn't do it, the Governor -- the Governor is doing it now in Western Maryland. They couldn't arrive at their redistricting and the Governor is doing it.

SENATOR JAMES: One thing I think ought to be in there, there ought to be a constitutional directive to reapportion every ten years at a minimum because, if you don't do that, in the past we've just had the legislature ignoring this mandate and --
