minutes in which to answer that question, maybe extending 1 it another five, and Mr. Thompson, I'm going to ask you the same thing. Thank you. MR. THOMPSON: In other words, what I want to THE CHAIRMAN: accomplish is the picking of your brains for the benefit of all of us, while we've got you here. MR. RATCHFORD: I think, looking down these questions pretty much in order, this first one is a question we have already mentioned. Baltimore City, I 10 think, should not be singled out for special treatment 11 because it is no longer a special category. Other units 12 have grown in size to be able to share its problems. 13 Exactly how you do this, I think, is still to be decided, 14 but I believe it makes sense, in my own feeling, to con-15 sider the City as one of the twenty-four major subdivisions 16 of the State, as it generally is in stated law and as much 17 as possible continue it that way. 18 I have already spoken on the aspect of the 19 small cities. In some ways, this is a problem area, I 20 think. If you say abolish all cities under a thousand 21
