eye with the Governor, that you could possibly function.
You would have to give him your resignation and get out,
that's all. It just wouldn't work.

THE CHAIRMAN: Well, I know that what you are
saying is so, but I am visualizing that there might come

a time when we won't be as fortunate to have a Jim Rennie in as Budget Director and then, particularly with a new Governor who may have completely new programs and plans, it seems to me that the Budget Director could put a spoke in the wheel, if he wanted to.

MR. RENNIE: Dick, the thought has never entered my head that I could possibly disagree with the Governor.

I give him my best opinion. I don't agree with him all the time, but I tell him what I think about the matter. However, once he has made his decision on it, then I'm through. It's his responsibility, it's his decision, and I do what he wants done.

Now, there is one exception, and I have always made this exception. I am also a procurement man. Now, if the Governor -- and governors have known this over the years -- if they ever ask me to do anything that I thought
