through the Department of Parole and Probation, has assumed this responsibility. In some of the larger counties, such as Prince George's County, you will find Probation Departments supported by both local funds and State funds. Such diverse arrangements have no justification in financial equity or efficiency."

Of course, earlier in this statement I proposed that all of the State offices and their supporting services, which would include Probation, should be supported by the State.

"Many of the ancillary offices of the Courts are financed from fees. Such systems violate all recognized sound budgetary precepts. Whatever positions and offices are required for the efficient conduct of the Courts, and allied services should be budgeted from General Funds; whatever revenues are generated from these offices should be included in the budget as a general fund revenue item."

Again, in making this recommendation, it is not

made in the interest of simply shifting costs to the State, because there are a number of revenues generated by the Courts through the Sheriff's Office, in particular, and in
