which is what is involved here and the public, local
government needs to have a stable, uneroded and tax basis
on which to proceed, and I think the public needs to be
protected not only with respect to the question of whether
the classifications are uniform, but with respect to whether
the results are equitable, so far as the burden of tax in
relation to --

THE CHAIRMAN: How do you feel about the provision in the Maryland Constitution which provides that land being devoted to agricultural use should be assessed for that purpose and not whatever its value might be?

MR. BOND: I've got an acre and a half and I've got a garden in half of my acre.

MRS. HOFFMAN: Mr. Bond, I don't know -- you've got your acre and a half in Baltimore City. I know how you feel about it. I feel that this is inequitable. I feel that if it's local public policy, and it should be local public policy to provide some kind of benefits to people actually holding open space land for open space purposes or preseving agricultural land for agricultural purposes, I think this is one of the real dilemmas of our

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
