which requires consideration of the budget first; but do 1 you mean what it seems to imply, namely that the legislature 2 can amend upwards as well as reduce the Governor's budget? 3 MR. LAUBER: Yes. I think it would be beneficial to have a provision that any increases in the budget be 5 separately stated and subject to independent veto by the 6 Governor, but I would see nothing wrong with this. 7 For example, suppose the Governor put in a budget 8 and the legislature wanted to increase State aid for 9 education and they were willing to give up the highway 10 program to do it. I see nothing wrong with them cutting 11 12 out the highway program and increasing the State aid to education, passing a law implement. 13 One other technical thing, and I may not have all 14 my facts straight on this; I understand that money is 15 carried in the budget in Maryland even for special bills. 16 In other words, if a special bill is passed incurring an 17 expenditure that the appropriation is not usually in the 18 bill because of the requirement that the bill must also 19 20 carry a revenue to be carried into effect.
