have a tremendously difficult problem of making representative government work in this country. If we can really strengthen our Legislatures and get them to the point they are able to take an soverview about the problems that confront a state, then it would seem to me you could feel confident in leaving the laying down of policy by general statute on something like changes in local boundaries to your Legislature to be done under general law.

It does seem to me that to have the idea built into your constitution of a local veto on boundary changes as to your basic units runs in the direction of inflexibility and is of dubious desirability.

THE CHAIRMAN: On that point, our thought at this stage of the thing and in this first report, the power to create new counties, cities or other political subdivisions will rest with the Legislature emanating from the constitution.

The referendum we speak of, when a new basic political subdivision is created, would be a Statewide referendum. It would not be restricted only to the
