2 wanted to do in the first place. We have a little bit of a
3 political problem here is what I am trying to say.

4 DEAN FORDHAM: I don't want to pursue the mat-
5 ter. I have expressed my point of view, except this.
6 Mrs. Freedlander's motion went beyond this to include
7 boundary changes with regard to any basic unit of local
8 government, is that right?

9 MRS. FREEDLANDER: Yes.

10 DEAN FORDHAM: That would relate to cities as
11 well?

12 THE CHAIRMAN: It would relate to cities and
13 any boundary changes in relation to cities and counties.

14 DEAN FORDHAM: If there is a question of annex-
15 ing territory to cities, you would have to have a vote of
16 the people both in the city and in that unit of government
17 from which the area was being taken.

18 MR. MILES: I don't think so. I think it would
19 be only in the unit being taken.

20 MRS. FREEDLANDER: Up until 1919 annexation in
21 Maryland could take place without vote of the annexed
