various alternatives with regard to policy. I frankly don't see any point in submitting all these questions to the Commission unless we have made up our minds on them first or at least made up our minds.

THE CHAIRMAN: Ridge, I would agree with that, except I feel it might be helpful to us to get some idea of the thinking of the Commission before we make up our minds; in other words, to see that the dog and its tail get attached. We've got to get some thinking of the Commission or we're going to be out in the cold somewhere, if we don't do it. So, my thinking is, actually, if I may -- make your comments, please, Mr. Thompson.

MR. THOMPSON: Mr. Chairman, I would just like to make this brief comment and that is that although I realize it applies to a narrow and particular area of government, nevertheless, I think it is such an important problem that you really ought to give some thought to it and that is one of the greatest inequities in local government today is thought by most of us in the municipal government is the problem of double taxation, that citizens of municipalities pay the taxes of the
