**BOWMAN, SAMUEL** (?–1768). BORN: of age by 1743/44. IMMIGRATED: by 1743/44 from Whitehaven, Cumberland County, England. RESIDED: in Talbot County; Kingstown, Talbot County, 1765. FAMILY BACKGROUND. SISTER: Jane, of Cumberland County, England. MARRIED on November 30, 1751, Ann (?–ca. 1774), daughter of James Dickinson (?–1738) and wife Hannah Coale. Her brother was William Dickinson, who married Mary Anne (ca. 1715–1775), daughter of *Thomas Bozman* (ca. 1693–1752). Her sisters were Elizabeth (?–by 1756), who married first, Anthony Richardson, and second, Rev. Philip Walker (?–1776), a merchant; Mary (?–by 1765), who married in 1738 *Pollard Edmondson* (ca. 1718–1794). Her nephew was *Philip Walker* (?–1791). Her nieces were Elizabeth Walker (?–1783), who married *Henry Dickinson* (?–1789); Ann Walker Mein Hindman (?–by 1787), who married third, *Henry Dickinson* (?–1789); and (first name unknown) Edmondson, who married *Christopher Birckhead* (by 1740–1788). CHILDREN. SONS: Samuel (1758–?), who married in 1791 Sarah Tyler, a Quaker; James (1759–?); and Joseph (1760–?). DAUGHTERS: Elizabeth (1752–1753); Mary (1754–1754); Ann (1756–?), a twin; Hannah (1756–1756), a twin; and Jane (1762–?). PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican, St. Peter's Parish, Talbot County. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., 1744. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS: in his will he requested that his two eldest sons be sent to Whitehaven, England, or somewhere in that vicinity after his death for their "improvement." OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: merchant. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Talbot County, 1758–1761. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 636 acres in Talbot and Queen Anne's counties (286 acres acquired through his marriage; 350 acres by purchase). SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: purchased 83 acres in Talbot County, 1767. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: between August 27 and September 16, 1768, in Talbot County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £3,741.12.2 current money (including 14 slaves, 1 servant, 71 oz. plate, 32 oz. old silver, books, and store goods); FB, £1,483.6.2. LAND: 719 acres in Talbot and Queen Anne's counties.

**BOYD, JOHN** (1737–1790). BORN: in 1737, possibly in Pennsylvania. IMMIGRATED: ca. 1761, probably from Pennsylvania. RESIDED: in Baltimore Town. FAMILY BACKGROUND. SISTERS: Martha Stewart; Jane Culberson; Mary Stelle; Ann Lloyd; and Elizabeth Smith. MARRIED on May 8, 1777, Ann (ca. 1747–1833), widow of John Little (?–1774), an innholder of Baltimore Town. Her sister was Mary Priery. CHILDREN. STEPDAUGHTER: Mary Little. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: College of New Jersey (later Princeton University), A.B. 1757; A.M. 1760. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Presbyterian, member of the First Presbyterian Church, Baltimore Town, by 1766. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: founding member of the Medical Society of Baltimore, 1789. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: physician, established a drugstore in Baltimore Town by 1764. Later took as a business partner Dr. Miles Littlejohn (1758–1815). PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Conventions, Baltimore County, 2nd–3rd, 1774. LOCAL OFFICE: Committee of Correspondence, Baltimore Town, elected 1774. STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES: provided in his will for the manumission of his slaves. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: acquired 153 acres in Baltimore County, plus 5 lots in Baltimore Town, 1780–1789, and at the same time took out leases on 2 additional lots in Baltimore Town. Leased out 53 acres in Baltimore County and at least 5 lots in Baltimore Town, and sold his leases on the 2 additional lots in Baltimore Town. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: on February 4, 1790, in Baltimore Town. PERSONAL PROPERTY: directed in his will that no inventory or accounts be made because he owed no debts. An inventory made in April 1801 totaled £5,133.0.11 current money. LAND: 153 acres in Baltimore County, plus 5 lots in Baltimore Town; 53 acres of the land in Baltimore County and the 5 lots in Baltimore Town were leased out.

**BOZMAN (BOSMAN), JOHN** (1650–1716). BORN: in 1650 in Virginia; probably oldest son. IMMIGRATED: by 1663 as a minor with his father from Virginia. RESIDED: in Manokin Hundred, Somerset County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: William Bozman (?–1664/65), who was in Virginia by 1649. MOTHER: Bridget (?–1660). STEPMOTHER: Eleanor, widow of Alexander Maddox, of Northampton County, Virginia. BROTHERS: William (1655–?); George (1659–1701). STEPBROTHER: *Lazarus Maddox* (ca. 1656–1716/17). SISTERS: Bridget (1653–after 1709), who married George
