

ERTY: size of estate unknown. LAND: at least 4,130 acres in Dorchester County, which John left to his two sisters Anne Muse and Elinor Daffin, wife of *Joseph Daffin* (?-1796), and to Anne Muse's two children.

ENNALLS (ENNOLDS, ENNALS), JOSEPH (?-1709). BORN: almost certainly in Dorchester County; second or third son. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Dorchester County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: *Bartholomew Ennalls* (1643-1688). MOTHER: Mary Heyward. BROTHERS: *Thomas Ennalls* (?-1718), who married Elizabeth (1664/65-1739), daughter of *Roger Woolford* (?-ca. 1701/2); William; *Henry Ennalls* (1675-1734), who married Mary, daughter of *Henry Hooper* (ca. 1643-1720); and Bartholomew. HALF BROTHERS: Francis Heyward; and John Heyward. SISTERS: Elizabeth (1664/65-1737), who married *Roger Woolford* (1670-1730); and Mary. MARRIED by 1692/93 Mary, daughter of *John Brooke* (by 1646-1692/93). Her sister was Ann, who married first, *Thomas Cooke* (?-1692/93), and second, John Stevens, son of *John Stevens* (?-1692). CHILDREN. SONS: *William Ennalls* (?-1731), who married Anne; *Bartholomew Ennalls* (ca. 1700-1783), who married first, Mary Smith, and second, Elizabeth, widow of William Taylor and daughter of *Henry Trippe* (?-ca. 1723/24); Thomas (?-by 1753); Henry (?-1734), who married Elizabeth Beckwith; and Joseph (1702-1759). DAUGHTERS: Elizabeth, who married *Charles Goldsborough* (1707-1767); Mary, who married *Henry Hooper* (ca. 1687-1767). PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: second generation Burgess; first elected after his brother *Thomas Ennalls* (?-1718) was promoted from the Lower House to the Upper House. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Dorchester County, 1704-1707, 1708A, 1708B (died before the 2nd session of 1708B-1711 Assembly). LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Dorchester County, 1702-1709; deputy surveyor, Dorchester County, 1707. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: over 650 acres. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: in 1709. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £640.3.2 sterling (including 8 slaves and 1 servant); FB, £628.1.5. LAND: over 650 acres.

ENNALLS, JOSEPH (ca. 1745-1779). BORN: ca. 1745 in Dorchester County; probably eldest son. NATIVE: fourth generation. RESIDED: in Transquakin Hundred, Dorchester County. FAMILY BACK-

GROUND. FATHER: Capt. Thomas Ennalls (?-1753), son of *Joseph Ennalls* (?-1709). STEPFATHER: James Hodson (?-1768). MOTHER: Anne. UNCLES: *William Ennalls* (?-1731); *Bartholomew Ennalls* (ca. 1700-1783). AUNTS: Elizabeth Ennalls (?-by 1739), who married *Charles Goldsborough* (1707-1767); Mary Ennalls, who married *Henry Hooper* (ca. 1687-1767). BROTHERS: William; Thomas III (?-ca. 1788), a merchant, who married Anne. HALF BROTHERS OR STEPBROTHERS: James Hodson; John Hodson; and Henry Hodson. HALF SISTER OR STEPSISTER: Elizabeth Hodson. FIRST COUSINS: *William Ennalls* (?-1785); *John Ennalls* (by 1746-ca. 1778); *Henry Hooper, Jr.* (ca. 1727-1790); *Robert Goldsborough* (1733-1788); Elinor Ennalls (ca. 1738-1793), who married *Joseph Daffin* (?-1796); Elizabeth Greenberry Goldsborough (ca. 1731-1820), who married *William Ennalls* (?-1785); Mary Ennalls, who married *Ennalls Hooper* (?-ca. 1763); and Ann Ennalls (ca. 1729-by 1790), who married *Henry Hooper, Jr.* (ca. 1727-1790). MARRIED first, ca. 1765 Mary (?-ca. 1773), daughter of Edward Trippe, Jr. (?-ca. 1756) and wife Anne (?-by 1756); granddaughter of Edward Trippe (?-ca. 1752) and wife Mary. Her mother's first husband was John Trippe (?-by 1746), of Dorchester County. MARRIED second, by 1779 Sarah Heron. CHILDREN. SONS: Thomas (?-ca. 1791), probably never married; William; Joseph; John; and possibly Henry. DAUGHTERS: Elizabeth, who married (first name unknown) Millis; Anne, who married by 1792 William Whittington. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1769; Esq., by 1778. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Convention, Dorchester County, 9th, 1776. LOCAL OFFICES: sheriff, Dorchester County, elected 1777; justice, Dorchester County, commissioned 1777; collector of clothing for soldiers, Dorchester County, appointed 1778. MILITARY SERVICE: lieutenant colonel, Upper Battalion, Dorchester County Militia, commissioned 1776; colonel, Upper Battalion, Dorchester County Militia, 1778-1779. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY: 18 slaves, 1776. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 1,742 acres in Dorchester County (217 acres probably inherited from his father; 116 acres inherited from his stepfather; 1,675 acres through his first marriage, 282 acres of which were released in a land division with his wife's half sister; 23 acres by patent). WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: on November 10, 1779, probably in Dorchester County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: size of estate unknown. LAND: 1,742 acres in Dorchester County.
