

Dulany, Jr. (1722–1797) and *Walter Dulany* (?–1773).

HEIGHE, JAMES (?–1757). BORN: probably in Calvert County, under 18 years of age in 1725; only surviving son. NATIVE: at least second generation. RESIDED: on the bay side near Plum Point, Calvert County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: James Heighe (?–1725). MOTHER: Ann. SISTERS: Elizabeth, who married (first name unknown) Sollers; Mary, who married (first name unknown) Sollers; and Althea, underage in 1725. MARRIED Betty (1715–?), daughter of *Thomas Holdsworth* (ca. 1692–1718); stepdaughter of *Benjamin Mackall* (1675–1761); niece of *Walter Smith* (ca. 1693–1748); half niece of *John Rousby* (1685–1744); stepniece of both *John Mackall* (1669–1739) and *James Mackall* (1671–1717). Her half brother was *Benjamin Mackall, Jr.* (ca. 1723–1795). Her sisters were Mary (1713–?), who married *Benson Bond* (1710–1750); Rebecca (1716–?); and Ann (1719–?). Her half sister was Barbara Mackall, who married *William Wilkinson* (?–1755). Her half first cousins were Anne Rousby (1721–1769), who married *Edward Lloyd* (1711–1770); Elizabeth Rousby, who married *Abraham Barnes* (?–ca. 1778); and Gertrude Rousby (?–ca. 1770), who married *Robert Jenkins Henry* (ca. 1712–1766). Her half nephew was *William Mackall Wilkinson* (1752–1799). CHILDREN. SONS: James, who married Elizabeth (1743–?), daughter of *James John Mackall* (1717–1772); Thomas Holdsworth. DAUGHTERS: Ann, who married George Gantt; Betty; Barbara; and Mary. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Mr., 1734. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: probably a planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Calvert County, 1749–1751. LOCAL OFFICES: churchwarden, All Saints' Parish, Calvert County, elected 1734 and 1736; justice, Calvert County, commissioned 1734, 1754, and 1756; All Saints' Parish Vestry, Calvert County, in office 1739–1742, elected 1746 and 1751. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, troop of horse, Prince Frederick, Calvert County, by 1748. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: more than 531 acres in Calvert County. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: owned 900 acres in 1753. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: between November 23, 1756, and September 12, 1757, in Calvert County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £1,489.0.9 current money (including 32 slaves, books, 28 oz. old silver, and one-third in-

terest in a boat); FB, £18.0.6. LAND: 900 acres in Calvert County.

HEMSLEY, PHILEMON (1670–1719). BORN: in 1670 in Kent County; third son. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Kent County; Talbot County, by 1671; Queen Anne's County, after 1707; Charles County, by 1713. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: William Hemsley (ca. 1634–1685), immigrated in 1658 from Yorkshire, England, with his wife and daughter. A Catholic, he was a merchant, doctor, and planter as well as sheriff of Kent County in 1663, clerk of Talbot County from 1668 to 1674, and justice of Talbot County from 1681 to 1685. During his lifetime he patented ca. 5,000 acres. MOTHER: Judith (ca. 1633–?). BROTHERS: *William Hemsley* (1661/62–1699); Charles (1665–1698/99); and Vincent (1672–1729). SISTERS: Penelope (1657–?); Judith. MARRIED first, Frances, daughter of Robert Noble (?–1684). MARRIED second, Mary Townley, widow of *John Contee* (?–1708). Her first cousin was Gov. *John Seymour* (1649–1709). CHILDREN. SON: *William Hemsley* (1703–1736), who married in 1725 Anna Maria (1709–1763), daughter of Col. *Richard Tilghman* (1672/73–1738/39). DAUGHTER: Ann. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant, converted from Roman Catholicism by 1689. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1709; Esq. by death. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: a merchant, who traded with Barbados; in partnership with Jonathan Forward, a merchant of London, England; contractor; planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Queen Anne's County, 1708A, 1708B–1710 (resigned before the 4th session to become sheriff). LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Talbot County, 1701–1707, Queen Anne's County, 1707–1710; sheriff, Queen Anne's County, 1711–ca. 1713. STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES: opposed the revolution of Protestant Associators in 1689. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: at least 356 acres and an unspecified amount of land inherited from his father. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: will probated on November 10, 1719. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £3,034.1.9 current money (including 44 slaves, 7 servants, and books); FB, estate overpaid £189.19.7. LAND: over 1,000 acres, plus a house in Annapolis.

HEMSLEY, WILLIAM (1661/62–1699). BORN: in 1661/62 in Kent County; first son. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Kent County; Talbot County, by 1671. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER:
