

owned a schooner. **PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Caroline County, 1783, 1784, 1785, 1787–1788, 1792, 1793, 1798. **LOCAL OFFICES:** coroner, Caroline County, 1778 (resigned), commissioned 1791, resigned 1792; appointed to execute the “act to prohibit for a limited time the exportation of Indian corn etc. by land,” Caroline County, 1780; justice, Caroline County, 1782—at least 1800; Maryland Senate elector, Caroline County, in office 1786; tobacco inspector, Choptank Bridge, Caroline County, commissioned 1786; sheriff, Caroline County, commissioned 1787, serving in 1791; commissioner of tax, Caroline County, appointed 1798. **MILITARY SERVICE:** captain, Caroline County Militia, 1786. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY:** assessed value £322.0.0, including 7 slaves, 1783; 11 slaves, 1790; 15 slaves, 1798. **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** 406 acres in Caroline County (at least 125 acres from his father, probably 125 additional acres from his father; 156 acres by patent); may also have had lands in Kent County, Delaware, left to him by his father in 1771. **WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED:** ca. 1803 in Caroline County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £2,555.0.4 (including 3 slaves, books, a schooner, large quantities of cloth, leather hides, and other merchandise); FB, £1,741.15.3. **LAND:** 588 acres in Caroline County; may also have possessed land in Kent County, Delaware.

**HUMPHRYS (HUMPHREYS), THOMAS** (?–ca. 1726). **BORN:** of age by December 1718. **IMMIGRATED:** ca. 1718. **RESIDED:** in Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, at least 1720–1723. **MARRIED** by October 30, 1723, Mary. **PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION:** literate. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Gent., 1722; Esq., 1723; probably well-connected, because in December 1718 he was recommended to Gov. John Hart in a letter written by Lord Guilford, the guardian of *Charles Calvert, 5th Lord Baltimore* (1699–1751). **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** attorney, admitted to the following courts: Anne Arundel County in June 1720; Provincial Court in September 1720. **OFFICEHOLDER. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Annapolis, 1722–1724 (Elections 1–3). **OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICE:** naval officer, Patuxent, 1722–1726. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** at least a house and lot in Annapolis (by purchase). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** sold his house and lot in Annapolis, 1723. **WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED:** by November 15, 1726, “near New York”; size of estate unknown.

**HUNGERFORD, CHARLES** (?–ca. 1805). **BORN:** probably in Charles County, of age by 1769. **NATIVE:** probably fifth generation. **RESIDED:** in Charles County; Frederick County (later became part of Montgomery County), by 1769; Virginia, after 1800. **FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER:** (first name unknown) Hungerford, son of Barton Hungerford (1687–1758). **MARRIED** Mary, who survived her husband. **CHILDREN. SON:** William, of Montgomery County. **DAUGHTERS:** probably six, but names unknown. **PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION:** literate. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** tavernkeeper, Frederick County, 1770; planter, 1800. **PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Montgomery County, 1780–1781. **LOCAL OFFICE:** justice, Montgomery County, 1780—at least 1785. **STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES:** His tavern was a meeting place of Montgomery County patriots, who on June 11, 1774, passed what became known as the Hungerford Tavern “Resolves.” The “Resolves” called for every “lawful means” to be used to secure relief from the oppressive acts of the British Parliament, including ceasing all commerce between Britain and her colonies. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY:** assessed value £908.0.0, including 20 slaves and 3 oz. plate, 1783; 29 slaves, 1790; assessed value £632.0.0, including 27 slaves and 3 oz. plate, 1793; assessed value £485.0.0, including 18 slaves and 2 oz. plate, 1798. **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** 350 acres of leasehold land in Montgomery County. **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** acquired 298 acres in Montgomery County, 1787–1800; sold 89 acres in Montgomery County, 1800. **WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED:** between December 1805 and January 1806, probably in Virginia; size of estate unknown.

**HUNT, WORNELL** (?–by 1728/29). **BORN:** probably in Yonghall, Ireland. **IMMIGRATED:** by November 1706 from Nevis. **RESIDED:** in Annapolis, Anne Arundel County; moved to West Indies in late 1716 or early 1717. **FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER:** John Hunt, of Ireland. **MARRIED** by 1707 Caroline. **CHILDREN. DAUGHTER:** Judith (1707–?). **PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION:** literate; admitted to Lincoln’s Inn in 1704. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** called “of Middlesex, Gent.” in 1704; an officeholder in Nevis, 1705/6; Esq. on arrival; imported twenty Negroes in 1709. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** lawyer, admitted to the following courts: Prince George’s County in 1706; Anne Arundel County in 1706; Provincial Court in 1707. **PUBLIC CAREER.
