

attending the General Assembly; buried in St. Anne's Cemetery, Annapolis. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £8,063.2.8 current money (including 63 slaves and 104 oz. plate; 20 oz. of the plate belonged to Mrs. Hindman's estate and 27 oz. was a legacy to his daughter Maria); FB, estate overpaid £656.10.7 current money. **LAND:** at least 4,837 acres in Talbot and Caroline counties as computed from deeds, patents, and assessments; actual acreage, according to surveys after Perry's death, was 4,522 acres.

**PHILLIPS, JAMES** (?–1720). **BORN:** probably in Maryland; elder son. **NATIVE:** probably second generation. **RESIDED:** in Baltimore County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** **FATHER:** James Phillips (?–1689) of Baltimore County, who immigrated by 1664, and was an innholder and planter. **STEPFATHER:** Dr. Benjamin Arnold (Arnall). **MOTHER:** Susannah (?–1708). **BROTHER:** Anthony (?–1698). **SISTERS:** Mary (?–1738), who married first, by 1689, *John Carvile* (ca. 1670–1709), and second, Richard Smithers (Smothers) (?–1731); Martha (?–1746), who married in 1699 *Aquila Paca* (ca. 1676–1721). **MARRIED** first, Bethia (?–1714), daughter of *George Utie* (?–1678) and wife Susannah, stepdaughter of Mark Richardson (?–ca. 1704/5). Bethia was the granddaughter of *Samuel Goldsmith* (?–1671). She was the niece of *Nathaniel Utie* (ca. 1635–ca. 1675/76); Blanche Goldsmith (?–1704), who married *George Wells* (?–1696). Her brother was George (?–1695). Her sister was Mary Ann. **MARRIED** second, in 1716, Johannah (?–1735), widow of (first name unknown) Kemp. Johannah Kemp Phillips subsequently married *Aquila Hall* (1699–1728), son of *John Hall* (ca. 1658–1737). **CHILDREN.** **SON:** James (1716–?), who married in 1737 Sarah Knight. **STEPSONS:** John Kemp; Richard Kemp. **DAUGHTERS:** Bethia (1702–?); Susannah (1718–1806), who married first, George Stokes (?–1741), second, Winston Smith (?–ca. 1752), and third, Talbot Risteau (?–1753); and Johanna (1720–?), who married first, George Drew (?–1735/36), and second, Jacob Giles (1705–1784). **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican, St. George's Parish, Baltimore County. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter; merchant. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Baltimore County, 1699–1700 (elected to the 3rd session of the 1697/98–1700 Assembly), 1704–1707 (Accounts 1–5), 1708A (Accounts), 1708B–1711 (Accounts 1–4, chairman), 1715 (Accounts), 1719 (Accounts 1; died before the 2nd session of the 1719–1721/22 As-

sembly). **LOCAL OFFICES:** justice, Baltimore County, 1692–1720 (quorum, by 1703/4–1720); justice, Court of Oyer, Terminer, and Gaol Delivery, Baltimore County, appointed 1715, 1718; St. George's Parish Vestry, Baltimore County, 1693–1696. **MILITARY SERVICE:** major, 1714; colonel, 1715/16–1720. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** household of 8 taxables, including 3 slaves, 1692; 5 slaves, 1694, 1695. **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** ca. 3,130 acres (ca. 2,000 acres inherited from his father, 1689; 500 acres inherited from his brother, 1698). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** acquired ca. 2,700 acres and sold ca. 3,000 acres, 1699–1720. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** on March 30, 1720, in St. George's Parish, Baltimore County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, 43,953 pounds of tobacco and £2,742.19.7 (including 29 slaves, probably 2 servants, over 116 oz. plate, 8 books, and merchandise); FB, £2,587.11.9. **LAND:** ca. 3,000 acres.

**PHILPOTT, ROBERT** (?–by 1650/51). **IMMIGRATED:** by 1637, probably as a free adult. **RESIDED:** on Kent Isle. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** **FATHER:** (name unknown), referred to as keeper of Hyde Park in 1638. **CHILDREN.** **SON:** Thomas. **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** probably Protestant. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Gent., by 1637/38. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** probably employee of William Cloberry & Co., 1637; planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Assembly, Kent Isle, 1637/38. Philpott, along with *Thomas Bradnox* (ca. 1599–1661) and *Edward Beckler* (?–?), was elected to this Assembly to represent the freemen of Kent Island. **LOCAL OFFICES:** justice, Kent Isle, 1637/38; commander of Kent Isle, 1638. **STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES:** made early submission to Baltimore authority on Kent Isle. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** by 1650/51. **LAND:** 350 acres on Kent Isle.

**PICKARD (PECCARD), NICHOLAS** (ca. 1610–1668). **BORN:** ca. 1610. **IMMIGRATED:** by 1648, as a free adult with wife. **RESIDED:** in Kent County. **MARRIED** first, Elizabeth. **MARRIED** second, Elinor, who subsequently married by 1669 Samuel King. **CHILDREN.** **SONS:** William; John (?–1698). **DAUGHTERS:** Elizabeth (1654–?); Sarah. **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** probably Protestant. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** no title on arrival; Mr., by 1660. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.**
