Elizabeth Goldsborough Campbell Stainton married on December 22, 1783, Richard Kennard (?–1796). **CHILDREN. STEPDAUGHTERS:** Margaret Cambell (ca. 1766–1789), who married on March 6, 1787, **John Henry, Jr.** (ca. 1750–1798); Ann Campbell (died young). **PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION:** literate. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Gent., by 1772; Esq., by 1779. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter. **PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Conventions. Caroline County, 1st, 1774 (appointed, but did not attend), 5th, 1775; Lower House, Caroline County, 1778 (elected to the 3rd session of the 1777–1778 Assembly to fill vacancy), 1778–1779, 1780–1781. **LOCAL OFFICES:** justice, Dorchester County, 1770–1773; justice, Caroline County, 1774—at least 1779; Committee of Observation, Caroline County, by 1776; collector of gold and silver coin, Caroline County, appointed 1776; justice, Orphans' Court, Caroline County, 1777—at least 1779; subscription officer, Continental Loan Office, Caroline County, commissioned 1779. **MILITARY SERVICE:** lieutenant colonel, Caroline County Militia, elected 1776, resigned 1777. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** 671 acres in Caroline County (all by purchase). Stainton also held 2,177 acres that belonged to the heirs of his wife's first husband, John Campbell (?–1766). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** bought 727 acres in Caroline County, 1774–1779. **WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED:** inventory made November 8, 1781, in Caroline County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, at least £2,063.13.10 current money (including 24 slaves). **LAND:** 1,398

acres in Caroline County, plus 1,506 acres held for the heirs of John Campbell.

STALEY, THOMAS (?–1700). **IMMIGRATED:** origins unknown, but in colony by 1668. **RESIDED:** on “Morefields,” north side of Gunpowder Hundred, Baltimore County. **MARRIED** first, (name unknown). **MARRIED** second, Mary, widow of Thomas Jones. **CHILDREN. STEPSONS:** Charles Jones (?–1701); Cadwalader Jones. **DAUGHTER:** (first name unknown), who married by 1696 James Durham. **STEPDAUGHTER:** Rachel Jones, who married Cornelius Harrington. **PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican, St. John's Parish, Baltimore County. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Mr., by 1699; Gent., at death. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter, merchant. **PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Associators' Convention, Baltimore County, 1689–1692; Grand Committee of Twenty, 1690–1692; Lower House, Baltimore County, 1692–1693, 1697/98–1699 (resigned before the 4th session of the 1697/98–1700 Assembly to become sheriff). **OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICE:** justice, Provincial Court, 1696–1700. **LOCAL OFFICES:** justice, Baltimore County, 1689–1692, 1694–1696; deputy commissary, Baltimore County, in office, 1693; St. John's Parish Vestry, Baltimore County, 1693–1696; sheriff, Baltimore County, 1700. **STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES:** achieved offices as result of Protestant Associators' Revolution in 1689. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY:** had household of 4 taxables, no slaves, 1692–1695. **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** at least 165 acres in Baltimore County; gave 50 acres to James Durham, 1697. **WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED:** will probated on November 4, 1700, in Baltimore County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, at least £189.13.10 and 29,816 pounds of tobacco (including 2 servants, books, and the horse that “moved” Staley to his death). **LAND:** probably 115 acres in Baltimore County.

STANLEY, HUGH (?–1669). **IMMIGRATED:** by 1656, as a free adult. **RESIDED:** in Calvert County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND. BROTHER:** John Stanley. **MARRIED** Dorothy, widow of Gyles Sadler (?–1662). **PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Protestant. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter; merchant. **PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Calvert County, 1669. **LOCAL OFFICE:** justice, Calvert County, 1658–1669 (quorum, 1664–1669).
