LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: ca. 1,712 acres in Queen Anne's County (ca. 1,700 acres inherited from father, remainder by resurvey and patent), plus a short-term lease on a house and outbuildings in Annapolis. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: gave up the lease on the Annapolis property, ca. 1775; had sold ca. 175 acres in Queen Anne's County by 1783; sold 200 acres in 1797, and 112 acres by 1798; purchased ca. 100 acres by 1798, all in Queen Anne's County. Assessed for 1,333 acres in Queen Anne's County, 1798, with his dwelling house and outbuildings valued at \$1,000. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: ca. April 18, 1809, in Chestertown, Kent County; estate probated in Queen Anne's County.
