

Wilkinson (1700/1–ca. 1758); Elizabeth Turbutt (?–ca. 1760), who married by 1742 **Thomas Harris** (?–1760); Anna Maria Turbutt (?–by 1749), who married **Edward Tūghman** (1713–1785); and Mary Lowe (?–by 1739), who married **Edward Oldham** (1709–1773). **MARRIED** Britchet Stone (?–1719). **CHILDREN.** SON: Henry (ca. 1703–?). **DAUGHTERS:** Sarah (1706–1773), who married **Nicholas Goldsborough** (ca. 1689–1766); Elizabeth (ca. 1708–?), who married in 1724 **Tench Francis** (1701–1758); Mary Ann (1711–1794), who married first, in 1730, John (1709–1740/41), son of **Thomas Robins** (1672–1721), and second, Robert (ca. 1704–1777), son of **Robert Goldsborough** (1660–1746); Mary (1713–?); Ann (1715–1766), who married **John Goldsborough** (1711–1778); and Rachel (1718–?), who married in 1735 Thomas Bullen (?–1750). **PRIVATE CAREER.** EDUCATION: literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican, St. Peter's Parish, Talbot County. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.** LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Talbot County, 1715 (Laws). **LOCAL OFFICES:** justice, Talbot County, by 1707–by 1710; St. Paul's Parish Vestry, 1708–1710, 1717; sheriff, Talbot County, 1710–1712; clerk, Talbot County, 1714–1720/21. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 1,075 acres in Queen Anne's and Talbot counties (all through inheritance). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** purchased 230 acres in Talbot County, 1720–1720/21. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** DIED: on March 18, 1720/21, in Talbot County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £1,464.14.11 current money (including 5 servants and 15 slaves). **LAND:** 1,305 acres in Dorchester, Queen Anne's and Talbot counties. At the time of his death, Turbutt was in the process of buying more land. He bequeathed money to his children to be used to purchase tracts named in his will.

TURBUTT, WILLIAM (1683/84–1739). **BORN:** on February 18, 1683/84, probably in Kent County. **NATIVE:** second generation. **RESIDED:** in Kent County; Talbot County by 1687; Queen Anne's County by 1716–1739. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** FATHER: Michael Turbutt (?–1696), who immigrated probably in the late 1660s, and who was clerk of Kent County, 1686/87–1689, and a justice of Talbot County, 1687–1689. **STEPFATHER:** Jacob Covington (?–1726). **MOTHER:** Sarah, daughter of Seth Foster (?–1674/75) of Talbot County and wife Elizabeth. **HALF UNCLE:** **John Hawkins** (ca. 1657–1717). **AUNT:** Elizabeth Foster (1658/59–1726), who married first, **Vincent Lowe**

(?–1692), and second, by 1694, **William Coursey** (?–ca. 1717/18). **BROTHERS:** **Foster Turbutt** (1679–1720/21); Richard (1681–?); Samuel, who married Rachel (1692–?), daughter of Nicholas Goldsborough (1662–1705); and Nathaniel. **SISTERS:** Mary, who married first, John (?–1713), son of **Henry Coursey** (ca. 1629–1695), and second, Thomas Hynson Wright (1688–1747); Sarah, who married Arthur Emory, of Queen Anne's County; and Margaret (?–1756), who married by 1726 Nicholas Lowe (1697–1745), of Talbot County. **NEPHEW:** **Thomas Wright** (?–ca. 1784). **NIECES:** Mary Coursey, who married **Solomon Wright** (?–1729); Elizabeth Coursey, who married **Thomas Wilkinson** (1700/1–ca. 1758); Mary Anne Wright (?–1747), who married **William Hopper** (1707–1772); Anne Wright (?–by 1754), who married **Edward Oldham** (1709–1773); Sarah Turbutt (1706–1773), who married **Nicholas Goldsborough** (ca. 1689–1766); Elizabeth Turbutt (ca. 1708–?), who married in 1724 **Tench Francis** (1701–1758); Ann Turbutt (1715–1766), who married **John Goldsborough** (1711–1778); and Mary Lowe (?–by 1739), who married **Edward Oldham** (1709–1773). **MARRIED** Elizabeth (ca. 1694–?), daughter of Michael Earle (?–1709), of Talbot County, and wife Anne Carpenter (?–ca. 1709). Her uncle was **James Earle, Sr.** (?–1734). Her nephews were **Michael Earle** (1722–1787); **Richard Tūghman Earle** (1728/29–1788); and **Joseph Earle** (1739–1777). Her nieces were Anna Maria Earle (1729–1795), who married **Thomas Ringgold** (1715–1772); and Henrietta Maria Earle (1730–1767), who married **William Hemsley** (1736/37–1812). Her first cousin was Jane Lillingston (?–by 1746), who married first, **John Wells** (by 1675/76–1714), and second, **Thomas Hammond** (1693–?). **CHILDREN.** SON: Michael. **DAUGHTERS:** Anna Maria (?–by 1749), who married **Edward Tūghman** (1713–1785); Mary, who married first, Nathan Wright (?–1767), and second, Thomas Bruff (?–1772), of Talbot County; and Elizabeth (?–ca. 1760), who married by 1742 **Thomas Harris** (?–1760). **PRIVATE CAREER.** EDUCATION: literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican; occupied pew 27 in Wye Chapel, St. Paul's Parish, Queen Anne's County, 1729. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Gent., by 1739. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** surveyor; planter; called merchant, 1720. **PUBLIC CAREER.** LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Queen Anne's County, 1716–1718, 1719–1721/22 (Aggrievances 1; Accounts 1, 3–5), 1728–1731 (Accounts 1–5). **OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICES:** justice, Provincial Court, commissioned 1732; judge, As-
