

of gift). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** patented 150 acres in Prince George's County, 1763; added 205 acres onto an existing tract, by 1769. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** will probated on February 27, 1769, in Prince George's County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £415.14.1 (including 7 slaves, 15 oz. plate, and books); FB, £182.5.6. **LAND:** 1,257 acres in Prince George's and Frederick counties.

**WARING (WAREING, WARRING, WARREN), SAMPSON** (ca. 1618–1670/71). **BORN:** ca. 1618. **IMMIGRATED:** by 1651, as a free adult, from Virginia. **RESIDED:** "of the Clifts," Calvert County. **MARRIED** by 1650 Sarah (1627–?), possibly the widow of Richard Young, possibly the daughter of (first name unknown) Leigh. Her brother was possibly Francis Leigh (?–1676). Sarah subsequently married by February 1674/75 John Hance. **CHILDREN.** **SON:** Basil (1650–1688), a justice of Calvert County in 1685, who married first, (first name unknown), daughter of John Hance, and second, Sarah, daughter of Richard Marsham (?–1713). **STEPSONS:** possibly Richard Young (?–1665); William Young. **STEPDAUGHTER:** possibly Elizabeth Young. **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Protestant, a Puritan. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** carpenter; planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Assembly, Patuxent (Calvert County), 1654; Parliamentary Commission, 1655–1657/58; Lower House, Calvert County, 1659/60. **OTHER PROVINCIAL OFFICE:** justice, Provincial Court, 1654–1657/58. **LOCAL OFFICES:** sheriff, Patuxent (Calvert), St. Mary's and "Potomack" counties, 1655; justice, Calvert County, 1658–ca. 1660. **MILITARY SERVICE:** captain, Calvert County Militia, 1655; commander, Herring Creek area, 1655. **STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES:** in 1660/61 fined 2,000 pounds of tobacco and barred from office and elections for 7 years for his participation in Fendall's Rebellion; released from his bond for good behavior in 1661. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** 150 acres in Anne Arundel (later became Calvert) County. **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** patented 200 acres in Calvert County, 1661. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** between February 1670/71 and March 18, 1670/71, in Calvert County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, 58,179 pounds of tobacco (including 5 servants); FB, 34,472 pounds of tobacco. **LAND:** probably 350 acres in Calvert County.

**WARNER (WARDNER), GEORGE** (by 1657–1703). **BORN:** by 1657, probably in Maryland; first son. **NATIVE:** probably second generation. **RESIDED:** on Still Pond Creek in Cecil (later became Kent) County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** **FATHER:** Andrew Warner (?–1661/62), who immigrated ca. 1650 with his wife and daughter. **STEPFATHER:** by 1664, Richard Gaines. **MOTHER:** Mary. **SISTER:** Isabella. **MARRIED** first, by 1679, Elizabeth, daughter of *Godfrey Bayley* (?–ca. 1670/71). Her sister was Rosamond. **MARRIED** second, by 1691, Anne (?–1705), daughter of Joseph Hopkins (?–1686). Her brother was Joseph Hopkins. **CHILDREN.** **SONS:** Godfrey (1682–1703); George (1692–1725), who married Sarah; and Joseph (?–1730, who married Anne Coale. **DAUGHTERS:** Sarah (1691–?); Ann (1694–?); and Mary (1697–?). **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Protestant, in 1689; Quaker, by 1692. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter, by 1678; merchant. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Cecil County, 1692 (dismissed during the 1st session of the 1692–1693 Assembly because, as a Quaker, he did not subscribe to required oaths). **LOCAL OFFICES:** justice, Cecil County, 1681–1687 (omitted from list of new commissioners on June 9, 1687, when the Council made alterations in the commissions after taking into consideration "the ill state of the County of Cecil at present"). 1688–1691/92. **STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES:** delayed taking oaths as justice under the Protestant Associators' government following the revolution in 1689; a Quaker, and therefore ineligible for office after 1692. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** at least 1,200 acres in Cecil (later became Kent) County (600 acres acquired from first wife, 600 acres by patent). **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** on October 8, 1703; will probated in Cecil County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £1,181.14.7 (inventory included 5 servants and 11 slaves); FB, £1,079.3.7. **LAND:** 2,400 acres in Cecil (later became Kent) County.

**WARREN, HUMPHREY** (ca. 1632–ca. 1670/71). **BORN:** ca. 1632, in England; probably second son. **IMMIGRATED:** ca. 1661, as a free adult with family. **RESIDED:** in Charles County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** **FATHER:** probably Edward Warren, Gent., of Stockport, Cheshire, England. **MARRIED** first, name unknown. **MARRIED** second, Eleanor (Ellen) (?–by 1677), possibly the daughter of Thomas Smoot. Eleanor married second,
