

1 probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and
2 particularly describing the place to be searched and
3 the persons or things to be seized."

4 That is tying it in with the Declaration of
5 Rights we now have, Article 26, but as I mentioned, it
6 is verbatim from the United States Fourth Amendment.

7 Section 7. "Any person accused of crime
8 shall have the right to be informed of the charge
9 against him in time to prepare his defense, to be
10 confronted with the witnesses against him, to have
11 compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his
12 favor and to have a speedy and public trial before an
13 impartial jury, without whose unanimous consent he
14 shall not be adjudged guilty."

15 This incorporates much of what is in Article
16 21 plus it adds public trial and it is again the
17 language from the United States Constitution, the Sixth
18 Amendment.

19 Section 8, "No persons shall be subject for
20 the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of punish-
21 ment or be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness
