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THE CHAIRMAN: No.

MR. CASE: I am sorry and I apologize.

THE CHAIRMAN: He didn't mention Professors.

He said interested groups to submit suggestions to the

Committee but merely in the way of suggestion to the

Committee.

MR. CASE: Of people aroundthe state.

THE CHAIRMAN: That is right.

MR. CASE: Why do we have to go to people around the state when we have what I am talking about right here?

THE CHAIRMAN: The suggestion might be to embody that language or not.

DR. BARD: I have been going through this and I do think that there are some portions of the Declaration of Rights which are historic and significant both. I think by way of illustration the point about Article 6 was a good point, excellent.
