check, which is perhaps not to be elevated outside of the responsibility of the legislator, but if you have a competent staff and these professional staff members are going over the proposed legislation, this staff itself would be a most important check on something bad or being submitted for consideration if it is not fully elaborated upon. After you have all of this, you have the potential veto of the Governor outside of budget bills.

Then if you want to tie it in to where you want to have a strong Legislature, the only real way

I can see you can strengthen it is by having one body rather than by diluting strength through two bodies, because one body can wield its muscles a lot more effectively.

Of course, the final check is the electorate, where if they don't like what that body does, they can do what they have always done with both houses, but here you can pin the responsibility a little more responsibly on those who actually cast their vote. It is not buck passing. Referendum could be a potential buck passing
