MR. MILLER: I want to know if it is in there anyhow, is there need to change it?

MR. CASE: I think that if it were my choice,
I would like to see us stick to the Maryland language
that we have had from time immemorial.

MR. MILLER: Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Are you ready to go ahead? Section 1.

MR. GENTRY: Section 1 as read is the statement of popular sovereignty. We have tried insofar as possible to avoid statements in this Section 1 of general aspirations and principles which although they might provide some guidance or objectives they are not actually enforceable and not actually statements of rights to be preserved, not actually susceptible of interpretation and enforcement in a court.

MR. SCANLAN: I just want to add one word.

As it now stands, the statement is all government, is instituted for their security, benefit, and protection. The people of the Third Reich and people of the Soviet Union were secure, had lots of benefits and as long as
