I am wondering why this was done here introducing this sort of statement where the basic idea was not to have this kind of statement in the Declaration of Rights.

PROFESSOR ASPER: We offered sort of excuse for that, perhaps put it in the wrong place. In the second part of the comments, we compare it with the present Declaration.

MR. GENTRY: Page 18.

PROFESSOR ASPER: We conceded this is not consistent with the approach suggested here but it seems to be a tradition of state constitutional conventions that lead off with a statement of principles. We thought one statement rather than four would be
