Section 1 we departed, we concede we have, from the approach of an enforceable Declaration of Rights, expression of delineation of those rights that are preserved. If that idea is to be scrapped, then we have to go back to the drawing board. If we can retain that, I think this section 1 is the one section that is going to present more problem than any other because here we have attempted to express some of the, this expression of soveréignty, which is a departure from expression of truly enforceable rights. We have incorporated as we go through Article 1 you will see everything in Article 1 of the present Declaration is in, in different language, true, but it is in our present suggested Section 1 with the exception of the right of revolution which we felt not one we want to recommend.

I think the Committee would MR. SCANLAN: have avoided possibly some of the objections that have been raised here if they had preceded their draft with a good preamble incorporating some of the exhortations to which Mr. Case referred including the right of revolution a theoretical right. They haven't done that.
