cause it may be that what you are seeking by your motion is directly contrary to what the Committee purposely sought here, and you may want to submit that question.

The language in Article 13 and Article 40 in several instances is precisely the kind of language that the Committee, as I understand it, has deliberately sought to avoid the use of; hath, for instance -- Every man hath the right to petition, and the use of, ought, in several instances. Now, are you suggesting or was it your idea to suggest a motion that that kind of language be preserved?

MR. CASE: I think the language in the Declaration of Rights that the language that, Every citizen of the State ought to be allowed to speak, write and publish his sentiments on all subjects is good language, and it is my motion that this Section be referred to the Committee with the instruction that where the language meets the point that they have made, that the language in the existing Declaration of Rights be used.
