would be envisioned by the general power to petition the Government.

PROFESSOR ASPER: First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States provides in its final clause, and petition the Government for redress of modality grievances. To the best of my knowledge, there are no such gaps as Mr. Case has suggested has ever arisen under

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{MR}}\xspace$  . CASE: Everybody can petition the United States in a

the Constitution of the United States.

MR. GENTRY: Any action of mandamus, I would think, is a broad aspect a petition of the Government.

THE CHAIRMAN: I can suggest one that comes to mind, the proposed Judiciary Article confers on the Court of Appeals and the chief justice, rule making power that is not conferred on the Legislative Branch and conceivably you could have a petition to the Supreme Court grievance in connection with the rules adopted by the court that would not be a petition to the Legislature.

MR. CASE: But you could do that, certainly, anyway, couldn't you?
