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petitioning other branches would be lost. You are not petitioning the Government when you petition the Legis-lature.

MRS. BOTHE: I had thought you were. Does the Committee understand it that way?

PROFESSOR ASPER: Never did know.

MRS. BOTHE: Then you don't feel this wording includes petitioning?

PROFESSOR ASPER: Includes everything.

THE CHAIRMAN: Professor Burdette?

DR. BURDETTE: The reason I would like to support Mr. Case's view, you could pass a law this Constitution would mean it would be sent to the Secretary of State or someplace else, and there would be no right for a citizen to address any branch of the Government or department of the Government that they, themselves, 'thought effective to address.

MR. GENTRY: And if the Legislature did that, it could be attacked as being unconstitutional, and the courts would say No, government means any branch.

MR. CASE: How do you know what the courts will
