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have considered it have come up on the side of bicameralism. Except Rhode Island which has MR. BROOKS:

It is coming up again. not resolved it.

MR. SCANLAN: They have rejected it but everything is subject to reconsideration. It is simple. On the one hand, too many cooks spoil the broth; on the other hand, two heads are better than one. Take your choice.

Before leaving this, Governor THE CHAIRMAN: Lane has a comment to make from the point of view of the Governor.

GOVERNOR LANE: First I will admit that everything said has some appropriate background and disagreement with the bicameral system. However, looking at it from my own experience, I think although it is expensive, although it delays, while the Governor is not permitted to vote in either House, he can send them a massage of persuasion, but he has no individual act that he influences one way or the other.
