1 amendment. He mentioned it was more liberal than the 2 Committee's language, and the hypothetical example that 3 Dr. Bard gave may not be so hypothetical that the Legis-4 lature could pass a law restricting the procedure for petitioning under the language that the Committee has 5 6 come up with whereas under Mr. Case's liberalized amendment, 7 which was defeated, it would be more difficult to do 8 that, since you have the right to petition any officer 9 in effect of the Government; and on those grounds, I was 10 for it, but it was defeated. I hope its defeat did not 11 mean you didn't want the broadest possible right of 12 petition written into the Constitution. 13 THE CHAIRMAN: I think the discussion is clear 14 on that. 15 Now, Mr. Case, you want your motion to the 16 second sentence? 17 MR. CASE: I would move that the second sentence 18 read that, every person -- start it out, every person shall 19 be allowed to speak, write and publish his sentiments 20 on all subjects, being responsible for abuse of that
