2 Most of the time it doesn't say, citizen. We are not
3 changing that.

4 MR. MILLER: I am not arguing that. I want
5 to know if it is the feeling of this Commission that any
6 foreign agent that gets in here would have the right to
7 do and say anything that no court or anybody else could
8 suppress him? If that is the feeling, we know what we
9 are voting on.

10 MR. CLAGETT: I don't think that was what they
11 mean when they say, he shall be responsible for the
12 abuse of that privilege. He can't get away from it, in
13 other words, Congressman, because he is still going to
14 be subject to abuse of that privilege.

15 MR. MILLER: I don't know in time of war and with
16 this modern type of war where you have Fifth Columns and
17 so, it seems to me, that we shouldn't invite people to
18 come in and try to tear down our government; and I see
19 no reason to say, anybody. Why can't we say, any citizen
20 of the United States, or something like that?
