tiate between whether a person is a citizen of the

State of Maryland or a citizen of the United States or some
other citizen, I think we are escaping what we want in
our Constitution. We want to protect everybody, don't
we?

MR. MILLER: I don't think so. I don't want to protect any enemy agent. I don't know whether you do.

THE CHAIRMAN: Did you finish, Mr. Hoff?

MR. HOFF: Not quite, but I can't conceive of the Constitution of the State of Maryland being drawn to protect only people who perhaps are citizens and brothers of the State of Maryland and not protecting somebody who may move here from New York who hasn't qualified as a registered voter or citizen or even from a foreign country. It seems to me that the language that the Committee has used here is overall that the freedom of the press and freedom of speech shall not be abridged, and we certainly have in here language that says that such rights can be abused.
