the newspapers now and then the freedom to worship in the National Constitution has been construed by some as not being an occurrence of people being free not to worship and I am saying that I would like to be clear that this is either freedom to worship or not worship. I am really asking the Committee as to whether or not the Committee thinks this means that a person is as free under this Constitution to be an atheist which I am not, but I think I am asking this question to be an atheist to have some kind of religious contention.

MR. GENTRY: I can't read anything in Lines

2 or 3 having suggested Section, No person shall be
restricted in the free exercise. There is nothing
there that says if you have no religion you are restricted
and that is what you are implying. It wouldn't follow.

THE CHAIRMAN: Your answer to Professor Burdette's question, then, is, you do not see any such mestriction as he is concerned about?

MR. GENTRY: No.

MR. CLAGETT: I have a different question, and that is referring to the language of the Section 3 as
