Every man shall have the right to worship God in such manner as he thinks most acceptable to him, and all persons are equally entitled to the protection of their religious liberties wherefore no person shall by any law be molested in his person or estate on account of his religious persuasion or profession or for his religious practice.

That is my motion to substitute those great words.

THE CHAIRMAN: A second.

MR. CASE: And I again say for the sterile language which has been used here which admittedly means the same thing, may even say it better, but it hasn't said it as long.

MR. SCANLAN: Happy for your last comment.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any second?

MRS. BOTHE: I am a little concerned. I may be off Mr. Case's motion slightly, but I believe Mr. Asper commented that it was unnecessary to put this prohibition on the uninhibited use of religion. The United States Constitution merely says that Congress makes no law
