is defeated and I would propose and like to see the vote on this basis that Section 3 be the first sentence of the proposed Section 3, and the second part be struck.

I am not following you at all.

MR. SCANTAN: How does that go?

THE CHAIRMAN:

MRS. BOTHE: That the Maryland Declaration of Rights only contain the provision analogous to the Federal provision that no law shall be enacted respecting the establishment of religion and the balance of the proposal as well as what Mr. Case proposes not be in the new Constitution.

I would like to comment briefly. We have had so much recent litigation on the question of Church and State, most of it arising from this issue of whether you are required to worship God or a belief in God at all, that I think it is folly for a new State Constitution to contain provisions which will leave open the positive Schowgurow case arising in Maryland again. I think the law should simply require the Legislature to be restricted by what has become the Federal constitutional concept, and the new Constitution ought to leave all the religious
