MR. MILLER: That is right. 1 2 MR. BOND: That will be all right. 3 THE CHAIRMAN: You accept it? MR. BOND: Yes. 5 MR. CASE: I accept it. MRS. BOTHE: I just want to emphasize what 6 Mr. Hoff said was a very sensible statement, that we 7 adopted the first half of this language, and if we are 8 going to use it, I think the second half has to come in. 9 10 too. I wish we could take a second look at it, though. 11 As Mr. Hoff said, this whole thing is based on the last 12 sentence which we cannot put in the new Constitution whether we want it or not. We are going to have to get 13 rid of this language and to use as much of the remaining 14 stuff as we can. Just because it has been there all 15 those years, it is just a lot of surplus in the Constitution, 16 and I think we have to consider whether we can have the 17 Report of Section 36 any longer; and if we can't, we might 18 19 as well write new language. 20 THE CHAIRMAN: Professor Burdette? 21 I have certainly voted as I have DR.
