MRS. BOTHE: I do feel that that phrase would mean that a person with a parking ticket might be able to demand, if he couldn't retain private counsel, to demand under Section 7 of the new Declaration of Rights, that an attorney be appointed to appear with him.

THE CHAIRMAN: Can we get going again, please?
