MR. GENTRY: I can only say, apparently it 1 doesn't satisfy everybody, and frankly, I would feel 2 better with the addition of, criminal punishment, rather 3 than to rely on, the same offense. 4 I will give you an example. MR. SCANLAN: 5 the Alger Hiss case, he was denied certain pension rights as 6 a Federal employee. He was also convicted of perjury, a 7 serious matter. Now, if the language you just read 8 were the law, Hiss could argue that you couldn't punish 9 him twice. Suppose he had been acquitted of perjury 10 and still there was a procedure where he could be removed 11 from the Government. He could argue he couldn't be re-12 There are enough of us that feel that certain 13 moved. civil penalties should be imposed, even though a man has 14 been acquitted of a criminal offense under certain 15 situations.
