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THE CHAIRMAN: Any questions?

MR. GENTRY: With the exception of the courts of law has been dropped.

MR. MARTINEAU: This doesn't reach the problem, as I understand it, of the Court of Appeals ruling that whatever the penalty the Legislature imposes, whatever makes penalty for a crime, does not conflict with this constitutional provision against cruel and unusual punishment. It always seemed to me to be not very good sense. I wonder, has the Committee considered what restrictions could be placed upon the Legislature in imposing, or establishing punishments for crimes that could be attacked as cruel and unusual punishment.

PROFESSOR ASPER: What language could be used beyond, cruel and unusual?

MR. MARTINEAU: Yes. Did you consider doing this and reject it? I don't see any discussion.

MR. GENTRY: We felt, and didn't put a whole lot of emphasis on it, but we felt again this was an area where you are going to have the strong Legislature everyone talks about and a Legislature which we can have
