full confidence in, and if so, this should be left to their discussion. We didn't attempt to spell out what the fines and penalties for the various crimes should be, nor to put any range of maximums and minimums. It would be virtually impossible.

MR. MARTINEAU: The only meaning of this so far as I understand it, the Court of Appeals has held that a court cannot impose a punishment for a crime in excess of what the law allows, and you couldn't do it anyway; so this sentence, then, is meaningless.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Haile?

MR. HAILE: There are certain offenses in common law where there is no maximum penalty, and this forecloses any court from imposing a \$50,000 fine for inciting a riot, for example.

MR. MARTINEAU: That may be true as far as nonstatutory crime is concerned, but I think it won't be very long before we are going to have a complete criminal law section covering all crimes and there won't be any common law crimes.
